From Father Douglas



Dear People of St Andrew's Parish,

Some weeks I write about spiritual, liturgical or theological topics, and other weeks more practical—but very important!—matters of our life together as the Body of Christ take precedence. This is one of those latter weeks.

First, our bishops have recently reminded us of the importance of having a plan in place just in case one of our liturgies ends up, God forbid, becoming an event through which COVID-19 is spread. Therefore, it is very important that we have list of everyone who attends our services. To this end, at our Sunday services, our greeters will now jot down on a form the names of worshippers who attend in-person (as well as the phone numbers and addresses of visitors whose contact information is not in the parish directory). At our weekday services, we will ask worshippers to write their own names on this form, as they enter. Please be assured, we are *not* in any way taking attendance! (We'll keep the forms on file for only a few weeks.) Rather, we just want to be sure we're prepared lest we need to do any contact tracing. (*Also*, please continue contacting Irene Connors if you plan to attend worship in-person. Irene very kindly and ably helps ensure we don't exceed our social distancing limits.)





Second, we both are aware and regret that online access to the Holy Eucharist on Sundays at 10:30 has been somewhat unreliable. Please accept my apologies for this. I have said to several people that just as we would not feel comfortable having someone drive to the church on a Sunday morning only to find it empty, neither can we be comfortable if our online worship presence isn't as reliable as it can be. To this end, we're planning to migrate to some more sophisticated hardware to broadcast this service. Very importantly, this will allow us to use a wired (rather than a Wi-Fi) connection. It will take us a few weeks to assemble all the equipment, but please be assured we are working on this! We want to welcome and include our online worshippers every Sunday, without fail.

In closing, as I gaze out the parish house window at Mt Algo, I have to remark: I don't think I've ever lived in a place where the colors of fall are richer or more abundant. Just one *more* reason Jim and I are so thankful we have joined you! Take good care.

May God continue to bless our parish, its people and their work.

All Souls' Day: Remembrance of the Dead



On Monday, 02 November, at 2:00 pm, we will celebrate an All Souls' Day Eucharist at which there will be a reading of the names of the faithful departed. These names will also be printed in the bulletin for All Saints' Day,





If you would like to submit names of the departed, please let Fr Douglas know, by email or telephone. All names received by 01 November will be included in the All Souls' liturgy, but they must be received by 27 October to be included in the printed necrology.

Allhallowtide Liturgies

In the western church, All Hallows' Eve (31 October), All Saints' Day (01 November) and All Souls' Day (02 November) comprise Allhallowtide. The ancient origins of All Hallows' Eve seem to be pagan in nature—and, to be sure, Halloween has become thoroughly secularized—but it is also a night on which the Church explores human mortality and Christ's rendering that a moot issue for all believers. On All Saints', which falls on a Sunday this year, we celebrate the intercommunion of the living and the dead in the Body of Christ—that is, the Church—with special emphasis on those Christians who died on account of their faith (martyrs, for example). On All Souls', we celebrate *all* Christians who have died, and especially those known and beloved by the local parish.

This year, we will have a full rota of Allhallowtide services:

- All Hallows' Eve Saturday, 31 October at 7:00 p.m. A unique service of some of the most dramatic non-Gospel readings in the Bible, as conceived by our own Ron Marasco ... followed by a quiet procession to the Close, where we will pray for God to protect and defend us as well as those who have preceded us in death
- All Saints' Day Sunday, 01 November, 10:30 a.m. A festal service that will begin with a procession inside the church as we sing For all the saints and will dwell on the collective lessons we may glean from our predecessors in the faith, and particularly those who have given their lives for it (There will also be a Rite One spoken All Saints' service that day, at 8:30 am)
- All Souls' Day Monday, 02 November, 2:00 p.m. A more contemplative mid-day spoken Eucharist which will include a reading of the names of all the faithful departed. Following the service, there will be a small reception in the church yard, adjacent to the Close (weather permitting)

Church Open on Election Day for Prayer and Meditation

On Election Day, Tuesday, 03 November, the St Andrew's church building will be open to the public during polling hours (6:00 a.m. to 8 p.m.) for prayer and meditation. We will read the brief offices of Morning Prayer (8:00 a.m.), Noonday Prayer (12:00 noon), Evening Prayer (6:00 p.m.) and Compline (7:45 p.m.); there will be no preaching this day. Otherwise, the nave will be a place for silent prayer and reflection, and Fr Douglas will be present throughout the day to provide assistance or care, as any needs arise.

A New Prayer Writing Team is Now Forming






Do you like to pray? OK, that was a bit of a loaded question! Hopefully, weall like to pray. But if you are especially interested in prayer, we may have a new opportunity for you. We are bringing together a group of people to write the Prayers of the People for our Sunday liturgies. The prayer book provides a general outline of what we should pray for each Sunday, but we are then called to use our skills, creativity and awareness of what is happening in our lives—as a parish, as a community, as a nation and as a world—to craft prayers that truly come from the hearts of the people of St Andrew's. (This is, by the way, why the Prayers of the People are traditionally read either by a parishioner or by a deacon, who serves the people.)

This will *not* be a heavy burden, we promise! We will probably create one sets of prayers for each liturgical season from Advent through Eastertide, and then one set of prayers per month during Ordinary Time, the season after Pentecost. Writing may be done individually or in groups ... and can all be done remotely. Father Douglas will work with this group, to help them along, as needed.






