From the Rector

A Day of Racial Justice Healing, & Reconciliation

Dear Friends,

At the diocesan convention last October, we voted to make Sunday, 10 February, a Day inaugurating a season of Racial Healing, Justice, and Reconciliation in The Episcopal Church in Connecticut. Our liturgies on that morning will include specially written forms of the Prayers of the People and of the Confession, as well as a Commissioning for the Ministry of Justice and Reconciliation. We will have the invitation to consider how we as a Church and as individuals may have, so often unwittingly, participated in institutional or structural bias against people of color, people who are somehow different from ourselves by reason of their skin color, their heritage, their religious beliefs or traditions.

In *The New Yorker* for this week, Louis Menand explores how some white supremacists enlisted some of our courts to build a system of discrimination against former slaves and their descendants that led to the Supreme Court's decision in Plessy v. Ferguson (1896), which established the legality of 'separate but equal' schools, even train cars. And over the past several months we have seen, in the strength of many peoples' feelings (one way or another) about the monuments erected to honor Confederate war heroes, how the scars of slavery, of the American Civil War, and of the Era of Reconstruction remain very real, deep, and easily enflamed.

We will be privileged to have joining us at the 10.30 liturgy on this coming Sunday Scott X. Esdaile, the President of the Connecticut State Conference of NAACP Branches, and he will speak at a Forum at Noon in the Parish House.

I invite you to come to church on Sunday and then to attend the forum, bearing in mind, as always, Jesus' 'Summary of the Law' --'The first commandment is this: Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is the only Lord. Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind, and with all your strength. The second is this: Love your neighbor as yourself. There is no other commandment greater than these.' [Book of Common Prayer 1979, p.351]

From the Rector

ANNUAL REPORT of the RECTOR 27 January 2019

As always, today I present you with some numbers. Last year, our Sunday attendance at some 103 liturgies rose to 4791, and our weekday attendance at some 63 celebrations of the Holy Eucharist and other liturgies was some 1774. There were also 203 services of Communion in hospitals, nursing homes, and private residences.

In 2018, we baptised six people --Gabriel Camiyah Besmer; Brynn Leigh Clark; Natalia Alexandria Edness; Grayson Nathaniel Gartland; Charles Robert Nierling; and August Xavier Chesterfield Nierling. The Burial Office was read on eight occasions -- for David Neil Bosserman; Josephine Webster Hart Bristol; Veronica Anna Morvai Bunkoczy; John Keith Goodrich; John Arthur Granger; Charles Ewing Hamlen; Mary Christine Hoene; and Lucy Pacocha Tremont.

2018 was a full year with another superbly successful Tag Sale, which raised more than \$28,000 for the Capital Fund. It was followed (it seemed as though within a week or two ...) by another wonderfully successful Christmas Bazaar, which raised more than \$7,000 for the Mission & Outreach work of the parish. Many, many people assisted with each of these events, both ably led by Pat Campbell and Marel Rogers. Christopher Rehkow again took charge of the annual Christmas Tree Sale, and that yielded a record more than \$5000 for the Operating Fund.

In addition, we received some \$24,000 in disability compensation for my months away and then part-time service after several complicated surgeries in 2017; and, we had a generous bequest of almost \$40,000 from the estate of Mary Christine Hoene. The Vestry chose to apply 20% of the disability compensation and 10% of the bequest to the Mission & Outreach Fund, and the remainder were invested in our Donations & Bequests account --that is to say, our endowments.

Moreover, and wholly unexpectedly, an extraordinary gift, the donor of which asks to be anonymous, of \$50,000 and to be used at my discretion arrived just before Christmas. I thought and prayed a lot about what to do, and the Vestry accepted my decision to give 10% of these monies to the M&O Fund and to have the remainder invested in our account with Donations & Bequests. This seemed to me to be most consistent with the expressed intentions for this astonishing generosity.

Our addition of The Close to our precincts some seven years ago has proven to be a popular alternative to burials in other places, and we are beginning to run low on available plaques for those who want to have their names engraved there as a memorial. Our ever-generous and creative architect(and past Warden), Wes Wyrick, developed a plan to increase the number of plaques within the enclosure which the Vestry accepted, and work began a few days before the recent snow and ice storm. A central feature will be added that will more than double the available space for plaques and will also allow a wrought iron cross, similar to the ones on the front covers of our Prayer Books, to stand in the center of The Close. Most of the monies needed for this work are already to hand in The Close Fund, and the remainder will be financed by the Operating Fund.

2018 was also a year that saw a number of changes. In addition to welcoming a new Vestry class in January, in May we said farewell to our Seminarian Intern, Tara Shepley, who is this year working with Nik Combs at Trinity Church in Torrington. Tara wrote a few days ago to say that the Commission on Ministry had recommended her for ordination to the diaconate, and that the Standing Committee had approved her: she hopes to be ordained within the next few months, and I shall advise you as to the date, time, and place.

In July, we said farewell to our Priest Associate of more than six years, David McIntosh, and he is now helping to form a newly-ordained priest in nearby Bethlehem. I feel his absence acutely. Although I am, so far as I know, cancer-free, it these days takes me a great deal longer to do less, and I apologise for that. So many of you have offered to be of help with so much, and I am deeply grateful. Our somewhat ... diminished ... staff --Heather Scofield, our Administrator; Tom Holcombe and Margie O'Brien, our Parish Musicians; Joan Cassel, our Financial Secretary; and Bill McLaren and Randy Osolin, our Sexton and our Verger-- have been beyond generous in pitching in, from things appropriate to their positions to moving heavy objects, and I am immeasurably thankful.

The same must be said of our vestry officers --Charmian Place, Christopher Rehkow, James Vick, Andie Sehl, and Bill Dillon-as well as the chairs of our various organizations and commissions -Chris Beers, Candace Conard, Nick Downes, Bernadette Ellegard, Ned Reade, Marel Rogers, and Melissa Schipul are among those whom I have not yet otherwise mentioned. A month ago, James was in a serious skiing accident, and although very badly injured he came under the care of Steve Morocco's nephew, a renowned thoracic surgeon at the hospital in Denver to which James had been air-lifted. James is recovering well, and although I panicked for a moment given how close to the end of the year all of this happened, I need not have done because our Assistant Treasurer, Andie Sehl, and our Financial Secretary, Joan Cassel, simply stepped in and saw to it that the Business Life of St Andrew's carried on with graceful precision. We all need to give a cheer or three for Andie and Joan!

Unusually, James is not seated at the table at the chancel steps: he is still recovering from his surgery and is in the pews whilst Andie delivers the Treasurer's Report. This is a change! And there are changes on the vestry -- the terms of Irene Connors, Wayne Giles, and David Lindley have drawn to a close and they, led by Janet Downes, have nominated Alice Hicks, Bob McDowell, and Eric Roper to succeed them, and they have nominated Lynn Perry to serve the last year of Jim Perkins's term since he is too ill to do so. Alice and Eric have never served on the vestry before, and Bob and Lynn are returning members: I commend this slate to you.

All of which suggests a lively and dynamic parish, which St Andrew's is

It is also a parish in which fewer people are choosing to make an annual pledge, and so the prospective income becomes more and more difficult to gauge: for, routine but not pledged income -- and our Treasurers have begun to try to track this-is not the same as promised income, which entails an intentional commitment

And it is a parish that is, like so many other parishes, growing smaller. The Bishops keep reminding us that we are entering, have entered, a new era in which many of our old customs, habits have become ill-suited to the times And so we need to acquire new ways of thinking, of being the Church, of living amongst and blessing as best we can people for whom the Church is simply foreign, unfamiliar It may be a time for us, each of us, to begin to live more intentionally than habitually, to look and to listen to the ways in which God may be inviting us to change, to grow into a new world that needs to know the love of God in Christ Jesus as desperately as any former worlds have done.

And this might begin very, very simply Perhaps sitting in a different pew from time to time (Candace and I just did) might start to shift, ever so slightly, our perspectives, allow us to notice something new, to hear something differently, to give the Spirit room to move If we are not wholly at ease, the Spirit can catch our attentions

St Andrew's is hardly a wealthy parish, but it is a rich one: here there are a dedicated group of people --they set up the church for worship and greet us at the doors; they help to lead the liturgies; they set up and then clean up after suppers; they count the Sunday collections, and they provide refreshments at Coffee Hours; they volunteer to work in a soup kitchen and they collect and distribute funds for those in need. They seem to have so much time to ... help, to bless.

And through each of them God is inviting each of us to wonder how we might do differently, think differently, live differently in memory of Jesus Christ. They invite us to be less habitual and to be more intentional, still more ... thought and Spiritfilled

That Spirit to which Luke's Gospel keeps referring is indeed moving, seeking to remake the world, to change each and every one of us

In short, St Andrew's Parish, Kent, at the end of 2018 is a lively and vibrant place of modest wealth: our endowments are now greater than they have ever been -some \$1.3 million, which is a cushion and (given our obligations) not a plump one And so our deficit budgets of this year and last should not frighten us, although they should indeed attract our attentions, invite us to wonder how we are being invited to live differently.

For this is also, and far more importantly, a place of enormous riches, and I thank you again and again for allowing me to seek to grow in the Faith amongst you
