Notes from the ECCT Convention

Report from the 2019 ECCT Conference

Three members of our Parish, Chris Rehkow, Rebecca Trautmann and Ron Marasco, represented St. Andrews at this year's ECCT Conference in Hartford, on October 26th. It was a lively, diverse and very well-attended gathering. (Tickets for Evensong were completely sold out!)

The day began with Bishop Laura Ahrens reflection on the Gospel of Matthew, the story of Christ's Baptism, and the moment of Jesus "coming up out of the waters" of the River Jordan to find the heavens had opened and the voice of God proclaiming "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

This reading, and Bishop Laura's apt reflections, captured the theme and spirit of the conference as a whole: The welcoming of a new day in the life of an everchanging church.

Both in the discussion groups of the Workshop portion of the day, and even in the official Resolutions that were later voted on, one could sense a church summoning the courage for the intake of breath needed to "come up out of the water" of global, national and local change and face this new and challenging day.

Bishop Laura's call was for us to step into the future with "imagination," unafraid of "innovation." And in Bishop Ian Douglas's Keynote Speech, he encouraged us to "view change as an opportunity." And never to waiver in our "confidence," because, in his words, "God has had, and will always have, the church that God needs to be about God's mission."

The topics of the individual group-discussions in the Workshops that occupied the first half of the day were many of the same issues pressing on the heart of our nation at large: Climate change, racial division, family care, and the social and emotional challenges facing our next generation-which was the discussion group that St. Andrew's representatives participated in.

What emerged from that session was a strong, almost "cry from the heart," especially from the young-adult members of the Conference who spoke. The upshot was a call for congregations to more proactively welcome young people into the daily life of local parishes. To think (in Bishop Laura's words)

"innovatively" about opportunities for inter-generational gatherings-both traditional and as yet "unimagined." And above all, to "deepen our listening" to both the voices and especially the silences of the young people we invite into our "presence" as a parish.

The second half of the Conference covered matters of administration, budget and the voting by representative members on Resolutions brought before the Conference for adoption.

One of the more touching parts of the day was the resolution and adoption of permission for two pairs smaller parishes to merge into single, larger and more sustainable unions. Grace Church, Broad Brook and Grace Church, Windsor merged; and Church of Our Savior, Plainville and St Johns, Bristol became a single parish, to be re-named Church of the Good Shepard.

Videos were shown documenting the bittersweet process of parishes shuttering one much-loved place of worship to pool recourses with, and be welcomed into, a new union with another parish. It was inspiring to see the common sense, emotional intelligence and good-natured humor of the stakeholders who spoke. The Music Director of St. Johns could barely contain his glee that the Plainville congregation's "far far superior" chapel organ had been relocated to St. Johns. "Now," he said, "even my mistakes sound good!"

It was a moment to admire the resilience and faithful spirit of fellow parishes. It was also a moment to count the blessings of St. Andrews. To be thankful for our many devoted members. And to ask for the grace to step into our future united in our commitment to always being a parish about which God can say: "I am well pleased."

In another example of innovative measures taken to keep the Church thriving, active and responsive to our times, a Resolution was presented and adopted that gives increased representational rights to groups that the ECCT officially calls "Worship Communities."

These are smaller cohorts of Episcopalians, as yet unaffiliated with a Parish, that have formed-often spontaneously--due to proximity, contingency or some other unique affiliation (i.e. retirement communities, colleges, underserved rural areas, or other iterations of connective worship) sanctioned by the Bishop.

Final votes taken were for the election of members of the ECCT committees, including the election of our own Rebecca Trautmann to the Commission on Ministry! The remainder of the day covered other business matters including presentation of the Budget, and analysis of data on demographics and vocations.

Then, at end of day, the Conference was adjourned and everyone headed for Evensong to join voices in words of surety and spark.






