Holy Cross Monastery

A Message from Trinity Episcopal Church in Torrington, CT



Your humble Messenger editor recently spent two wonderful nights at <u>Holy Cross Monastery</u> and while he feels it is one of the best kept secrets, he also feels compelled to share this place with you, the faithful reader.

Located in West Park NY, on the western bank of the Hudson River, and only 90

minutes from Torrington CT, Holy Cross Monastery is home to about 20 Episcopal Benedictine monks who seriously practice hospitality - they run a guesthouse where all are invited to worship with them (or not), break bread with them, and find God in the peace of their surroundings.

People are invited stay at the guesthouse - single rooms are available for about \$85 on weeknights and \$100 on weekends - these are suggested donations, and you can make arrangements for payment assistance. They also have a full list of retreat options, too. This summer, I attended a poets retreat that was great. With all these retreats, there is time to gather with others, but also time to reflect, to rest, and to do what the Spirit calls you to do.

You can worship with them, or not - there is no obligation. In their beautiful yet simple chapel, they chant during 7am Matins, 9am Eucharist, noon Diurnum, 5pm Vespers, and 8pm Compline.

Three meals are served each day by a chef who attended the Culinary Institute of America - the food is divine! While you eat breakfast or dinner, you might see deer through the windows that overlook their backyard.

The monks observe Great Silence after Compline and until 8:30 in the morning, so it is a truly peaceful place.

You can hike some beautiful trails along the Hudson, or visit nearby towns such as New Paltz and Kingston. You can read, pray, nap, knit, puzzle, visit their gift shop, or do what you desire, so long as you are respectful of the peace. During our most recent visit, I enjoyed reading and hiking, my wife also read and napped, and my teenage daughter listened to music with her ear buds while sketching. We also took in a movie in Kingston and shopped in New Paltz.

Here at the monastery, there is a delightful quiet. It is restful and rejuvenating. It is an easy place, where you can do as you wish.

If you would like more information about Holy Cross Monastery, please contact me, and I would be happy to share more with you.

I'm wondering, too, if there is interest in going on a guided retreat together as a group - I know that about ten years ago, some folks from Trinity Torrington used to go on retreat there, but then the numbers dwindled. Please see email me if you might be interested in this, too.
