From Father Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's,

I hope you are doing well and looking forward to this Labor Day (how can it be already?!) weekend.

This Tuesday, we will begin our five-week course *An Introduction to The Book of Common Prayer*. I think most of us, like most Episcopalians, know that the "BCP" is the cornerstone of our weekly worship: that most of what we say and do on Sunday mornings is found in, or at least informed by, the BCP—usually those pages around 355 that often are a bit more dog-eared than the others.

The BCP contains, however, a wealth—truly, a *treasure*—of other resources: liturgies, prayers, sacramental rites, history, calendars. All of this rich content is collated in one single book because, in the Anglican tradition, the way we pray (that is, the way we worship—the way we speak to and speak about God) is the *primary* way we learn what we believe.

- If you want to know what Episcopalians think about baptism, read the Rite of Holy Baptism on page 298.
- If you wonder whether we believe God inflicts illness on people as

- punishment (we don't), read the Rite of Ministration to the Sick (p 453) and some of BCP's prayers for the sick and the dying (p 458).
- If you you're concerned about our praying to (or too much to) the saints, skim through some of the collects appointed for their feast days, which begin on page 237. If you want to know when these seemingly random days are, look at the BCP's main calendar, starting at p 19.
- And if you want a high-level synopsis of the entire body of traditional Episcopal beliefs, sit down with the Catechism, which opens on page 844.

All of this is to say: As our 'worship manual,' the BCP guides us to pray ... and then "read, mark, learn and inwardly digest" (p 236) what we've prayed ... in order that we might explore, expand and deepen our faith and constantly renew our commitment to Christ. Along with Scripture, the BCP is a treasure we all benefit from knowing as well as we can.

So, whether you'd like to get started ... or know a little but want a fresh start ... or are a BCP pro and just want some context ... come to the parish house this Tuesday morning at 11:00, and then plan to come back for the following four weeks, as well.

(There is *no homework* for these classes, but I'll suggest a small amount of background reading for each class for those who like a head-start. For this Tuesday, you can skim the **preface to the 1662 (English) Book of Common Prayer**; the preface to the 1789 (U.S.) Book (our BCP, p 9); and our BCP's table of contents. If you don't have a copy of the BCP at home, **bcponline.org** is a very user-friendly online version.)

Take good care, and may God continue to bless the work of the Kingdom you are doing.

Beginning This Week: Introduction to the Prayer Book



Have you always wondered what *else* is in the 1,000 pages of *The Book of Common Prayer*, in addition to the few pages we use on Sunday morning? Does the fact that it even has 1,000 pages intimidate you a little? Have you tried praying Morning or Evening Prayer on your own but

ended up a bit bewildered? Would you like to know more about the Church's calendar and psalms and prayers?

Well, you're in luck! **For five consecutive weeks, beginning this Tuesday, o6 September, at 11:00 am,** we will explore the wonderful heritage and thoughtful theology that is our *Book of Common Prayer*. Each class will be a self-contained unit, focusing on one aspect of the BCP, starting with its history: how it came to be ... and to be revised ... over the last 450 years. (In November, we'll offer a few 'bonus' sessions on some lesser-known features of the BCP. But the September / October classes will cover all the fundamentals.)

It is an ancient adage of the Church that *the way we pray*—the way we worship —*constitutes what we believe*. For Episcopalians, the BCP *is* the way we pray. So, if you'd like to know more about what we believe (and, thus, why we pray as we do), please be sure to join us!


Next Sunday, 11 September: Homecoming Sunday
