#### From Father Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's Parish,

I hope you are doing well and have begun the observance of a blessed and holy Lent.

As I announced last week, beginning this Sunday, 06 March, we will no longer be requiring anyone to wear a mask in worship (or any other parish event). Anyone who chooses to wear a mask, however, is welcome to do so.

This decision, which I vetted with the Worship Committee and then sought the Vestry's approval of, takes into account several current realities: The Omicron surge is firmly in retreat; vaccination rates are, presumably, about as high as they are likely to go in the near term; and many state and local governments and businesses are lifting their masking requirements.

I believe our collective national mindset about COVID is changing, as

well. Many of us are, both publicly and privately, now discussing COVID in terms of living with it, as with the common cold or influenza, rather than eradicating it altogether. Over the last week, I have read a few articles in which the notion of 'individual decision; social responsibility' has been discussed: Each person chooses whether or not to wear a mask, but also takes cognizance of the fact that choosing not to wear one in the presence of certain factors (*e.g.*, not being vaccinated; having been exposed to COVID recently, etc) may have adverse consequences for others. Another public health thought leader spoke in terms of masks being like raincoats: We all own them, but we wear them when we need to and not all of the time. I find all of this consistent with the Christian hope that we have in and through Our Lord and Savior, complemented by the gifts of knowledge and wisdom with which our Creator has endowed us.

The Worship Committee and I briefly considered a two-fold approach in which masks would be required for those who were not vaccinated but not required for those who were. As a pastor, however, I am not comfortable creating any such division within our parish family. As your priest, I *do* presume that if you are not vaccinated, you either have a sound medical reason for this that you've discussed with your physician; or you have prayed deeply about this and discerned, with the Holy Spirit, that this decision is the right one for you.

We may reinstate a mask requirement if we experience another surge. The latest guidance from the CDC is to look at a three-fold measure (number of COVID cases, number of hospitalizations and availability of hospital beds) to determine when masks are recommended. Right now, Litchfield County is "Low" on this score; universal mask-wearing is indicated only at "High."

When you come to church on Sunday, you will notice a new sign on the door: "Masks are optional, and welcome." I think this a good tone for us to take now—and one that allows us all to practice the dual mission Jesus calls us to: generous hospitality and heartfelt love of others.

In my early Lenten readings, I came across the following excerpt from a poem by Oscar Wilde. "The Ballad of Reading Gaol [*i.e.,* Jail]" is a long meditation on the life of convicts in a late nineteenth century prison, with a particular eye toward the hanging of a man sentenced to death. I find that these three stanzas, however, speak well nigh universally for those who choose to contemplate their own sinfulness—and Christ's promised forgiveness. And so, I offer then to you for the beginning of your Lenten journey.

... And thus we rust Life's iron chain Degraded and alone:
And some men curse, and some men weep, And some men make no moan:
But God's eternal Laws are kind And break the heart of stone.

And every human heart that breaks, In prison-cell or yard, Is as that broken box that gave Its treasure to the Lord, And filled the unclean leper's house With the scent of costliest nard.

Ah! happy day they whose hearts can break And peace of pardon win!How else may man make straight his plan And cleanse his soul from Sin?How else but through a broken heart May Lord Christ enter in?

Take good care, and may God continue to bless the work of the Kingdom you are doing.

# Our Interim Director of Music: Welcome, Susan Guse!



The Music Commission is delighted to announce that **Susan Guse** (pronounced "goosey") has agreed to serve as our Interim Music Director through the end of August, while we complete our search for a permanent

director. Susan's first day with us was Ash Wednesday.

A resident of Hopewell Junction, New York, Susan says she enjoys a beautiful commute to Kent. Most recently, she supplied for three months at Trinity Episcopal, in Fishkill, New York, and one month at Zion Episcopal, in Wappingers Falls.

From January 1990 until her retirement in August 2020, Susan was Children's Choir Director for eight years, and then Music Director for twenty-two years at St John's Lutheran Church in Poughkeepsie. The church music program expanded rapidly during her tenure. Saint John's installed a new Casavant Pipe Organ in 1998 and purchased five octaves of handbells and five octaves of chimes in 2000. Under Susan's supervision, St John's had four Handbell Choirs, Children's Choirs, an Adult Choir as well as a String Ensemble, Recorder Ensemble and Brass Ensemble.

## Worship During Lent: Wednesday Evenings



On Wednesday evenings during Lent, our customary 6:00 pm Eucharist will be preceded by an opportunity for the Rite of Reconciliation (more popularly known as "Confession"; *Book of Common Prayer*, p 447), in private, at 5:00 pm; and, at 5:30 pm, by the *Way of the Cross*, a liturgy of 14 very short lessons that lead us to reflect on Jesus' sacrifice and death ... and our need of the forgiveness He's already given us. (You may come for one, two or all three of these offerings. They are separate rites, and you needn't stay for all of them.)

If you have never attended a mid-week Eucharist ... or if you're interested in exploring Confession or the Way of the Cross ... Lent is an excellent time to 'try on' one of these new liturgical practices and reflect on how it draws you closer to God. Please come!

# New for Lent: A Small Group Journey Through *The Way of Love*



Our primary Lenten offering this year will be a small group that will come together to journey through the Episcopal Church's *Way of Love*. The *Way of Love* is a set of seven very simple disciplines—shown in the graphic, above—intended to connect us with Jesus more regularly and more deeply in our daily lives. It is *not* a lot of reading or theology, but rather a call to personal reflection and experimentation (for example, trying to read the Bible for 10 minutes each day). A brief video introduction to the *Way* is available here. While you can engage the *Way of Love* alone, it's an even richer spiritual journey when taken as a group: We are enriched by each others' experiences and supported by our commitment to the group.

Therefore, on **nine Tuesday evenings, beginning on 08 March**, a small group will come together at 6:00 pm in the Parish House. We'll share a simple supper and then take time to share with one another ... and discuss how to 'do' the *Way of Love* in our own lives. We'll close each evening with a brief service of Compline, and then be on our way home no later than 8:00.

This really is a low-cost, low-risk spiritual 'try-on' that stresses flexibility, doability and being gentle with oneself. It's ideal for anyone who's seeking to go a little deeper ... to live a little more intentionally ... to hold their faith in their heart and not just their head. And all are welcome!! # Summary of the February Vestry Meeting



The Vestry's meeting on 17 February—the first for our newly elected members —was devoted mostly to welcomes and orientation. The Vestry also approved several routine motions governing our financial and banking operations and appointing chairs of various parish commissions and committees. The annual Parochial Report for 2021 was also approved.

### "New" Vestments for Lent

You may notice that we are using new, deep violet vestments for Lent this year. I received these as an ordination gift from the very first parish I ever served, as an intern before I began seminary: Holy Apostles' in Yardville, New Jersey. A parishioner named Lynda with whom I'd grown close during my time there had, in turn, donated them to Holy Apostles'. The vestments had been made for her father, who was, like me, also a 'second-career' priest. Very sadly, Lynda's father died not very long after he was ordained to the priesthood.

This set of vestments includes a frontlet, which hangs only part-way to the ground, rather than the complete frontal to which we are accustomed. The frontlet enables us to view the legs of the Altar and see it as a true table where, indeed, a banquet is served at every Holy Eucharist.

### This Date in Our Parish History



We recently observed an important milestone in St Andrew's history. Tuesday, 22 February, marked the 214th anniversary of the meeting held to form and organize an Episcopal parish in Kent. While there had been Anglican, and then Episcopal, worship in Kent since the 1760s, it wasn't until 1808 that formal action was taken to establish a parish here. And look at us now!




