(Anonymous work dating from the mid-11th Century) **Luke 17:11-19:: Proper 23, Year C**

From Father Douglas

Dear People of St Andrew's,

I hope you are doing well, and thank you to one and all who joined us, either in person or in spirit, to make last Sunday's Blessing of the Animals such a joy! I was amazed at how many people and critters ... including one lizard, two chickens and three horses! ... came for a time of dedication, renewal and fellowship. I've included just a few photos, below, that reflect the flavor of the day.

I write this column from a liturgy conference I'm attending in Rhode Island. This morning, the dean of (Episcopal) Berkeley Divinity School, in New Haven, gave the keynote address entitled "The Providential Eucharist." This was partially a pun on fact that we're meeting in our neighboring state's capital city. But the Very Rev Andrew McGowan chose this title more because he believes that the Eucharist veritably overflows with divine love and grace in ways that we too often don't give sufficient thought or voice to. (I agree!)

Providence is a very fine theme for this particular season here at St Andrew's. For one thing, our annual stewardship campaign is now in full swing. As I mentioned in last week's sermon, there are many, many reasons we are called, as Christ's disciples, to support our home parish: everything from making sure the lights turn on and the buildings are maintained ... to a desire to participate in sharing the Good News of Jesus with our neighbors in the community and across the world. But whatever reason—or, hopefully, reasons—motivate you, all of our stewardship begins and ends in *exactly* the same place: the providence of God. We pledge our monies to the church because God has blessed every one of us with an abundance of goodness; and in so pledging, we make those blessings real and tangible and practical in and for a world so sorely in need of Christ's healing, saving message. So please, I encourage you, consider the providence God has showered across your life, and make a pledge that will share it with others at St Andrew's, in Kent and beyond.

Providence is also a good theme right now because it is, in a way, what the Rev Canon Tim Hodapp is coming to us to talk about this coming Sunday. Tim is the diocese's Canon (that is, a special officer appointed directly by the bishop) for Mission Advancement and Coaching, and he assists all of our priests-incharge (PIC); he has been a great resource and sounding board for me. Tim will preach at both Eucharists, and during coffee hour following the 10:30 liturgy, he will tell us a little more about the third and final year of the PIC process that we have now entered: what will happen, what we can expect and what the next steps are. He'll be glad to take your questions, too. Over the last two-plus years, God has showered providence upon Jim and me in calling us to St Andrew's, and I pray that you, as parishioners, feel much the same. So, please plan to come on Sunday and hear what lies ahead of us, as we stand ready to receive the still *greater* blessings we know God has in store.

Take good care, and may God continue to bless the work of the Kingdom you are doing.

But flowers are a part of our worship, and as we begin the season of autumn, when the flowers growing around us are fading, perhaps we should think how we might bring the joy and beauty that they contribute to our Sunday worship to those who cannot attend St Andrew's.

There is a long list of names on the Prayer List. My suggestion to all of us is to find a person on that list, perhaps an old friend or perhaps someone you have not met, and take the Sunday flowers to them. Vases will be available in the Narthex: simply arrange one vase and make that visit. It can be Sunday immediately after the 10:30 service, Monday or whenever you can visit that person.

Taking flowers to shut-ins, those recovering from an illness or welcoming a new baby, someone mourning a loss or someone who could just use a lift used to be a regular part of how St Andrew's parishioners cared for each other. We can do it again, and I predict we'll find as much joy in making these visits as those we visit find in receiving them.


