If you read Katherine Almquist's column two weeks ago, you will understand when I say, I am so grateful she said "yes." I know she would not mind my saying that she would welcome more hands in her endeavors (next will be Maundy Thursday and Easter) and more coffee hour hosts. This past weekend we saw the return of live non-liturgical music to the nave, when the Kent Singers performed their long-delayed *Songs of the British Isles* on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Also this weekend masks at our services became optional and welcome. And our interim music director Susan Guse led the choir and played the organ, both with grace and skill. A grateful welcome to Susan.

As the season of Lent begins, I commend a short book I discovered by happenstance: *The Hope of Glory: Reflections on the Last Words of Jesus from the Cross* by Jon Meacham, a historian known for his presidential biographies. I have found it a thoughtful and provocative mix of history and theology.

In my own Lenten reading I have returned to Russell Levinson's Lenten

companion, *A Path to Wholeness*. A passage I read earlier this week included a prayer that seemed particularly poignant in light of the present war against the people of Ukraine. It was written by an unknown prisoner at Ravensbruck Concentration Camp.

O Lord, remember not only the men and women of good will, but also those of ill will. But do not remember all the suffering they have inflicted on us; remember the fruits we have brought, thanks to this suffering—our comradeship, our loyalty, our courage, our generosity, the greatness of heart which has grown out of all this, and when they come to judgment let all the fruits which they have borne be their forgiveness.

Almighty God, kindle, we pray, in every heart the true love of peace, and guide with your wisdom those who take counsel for the nations of the earth, that in tranquility your dominion may increase until the earth is filled with the knowledge of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The Music Commission is delighted to announce that **Susan Guse** (pronounced "goosey") has agreed to serve as our Interim Music Director through the end of August, while we complete our search for a permanent director. Susan's first day with us was Ash Wednesday.

A resident of Hopewell Junction, New York, Susan says she enjoys a beautiful commute to Kent. Most recently, she supplied for three months at Trinity Episcopal, in Fishkill, New York, and one month at Zion Episcopal, in Wappingers Falls.

From January 1990 until her retirement in August 2020, Susan was Children's Choir Director for eight years, and then Music Director for twenty-two years at St John's Lutheran Church in Poughkeepsie. The church music program expanded rapidly during her tenure. Saint John's installed a new Casavant Pipe Organ in 1998 and purchased five octaves of handbells and five octaves of chimes in 2000. Under Susan's supervision, St John's had four Handbell Choirs, Children's Choirs, an Adult Choir as well as a String Ensemble, Recorder Ensemble and Brass Ensemble.


St Andrew's Current COVID Status

Worship During Lent: Wednesday Evenings



On Wednesday evenings during Lent, our customary 6:00 pm Eucharist will be preceded by an opportunity for the Rite of Reconciliation (more popularly known as "Confession"; *Book of Common Prayer*, p 447), in private, at 5:00 pm; and, at 5:30 pm, by the *Way of the Cross*, a liturgy of 14 very short lessons that lead us to reflect on Jesus' sacrifice and death ... and our need of the forgiveness He's already given us. (You may come for one, two or all three of these offerings. They are separate rites, and you needn't be present for all of them.)

If you have never attended a mid-week Eucharist ... or if you're interested in exploring Confession or the Way of the Cross ... Lent is an excellent time to

'try on' one of these new liturgical practices and reflect on how it draws you closer to God. Please come!

New for Lent: A Small Group Journey Through *The Way of Love*



Our primary Lenten offering this year will be a small group that will come together to journey through the Episcopal Church's *Way of Love*. The *Way of Love* is a set of seven very simple disciplines—shown in the graphic, above—intended to connect us with Jesus more regularly and more deeply in our daily lives. It is *not* a lot of reading or theology, but rather a call to personal reflection and experimentation (for example, trying to read the Bible for 10 minutes each day). A brief video introduction to the *Way* is available here. While you can engage the *Way of Love* alone, it's an even richer spiritual journey when taken as a group: We are enriched by each others' experiences and supported by our commitment to the group.

Therefore, on **nine Tuesday evenings, beginning on 15 March**, a small group will come together at 6:00 pm in the Parish House. We'll share a simple supper and then take time to share with one another ... and discuss how to 'do' the *Way of Love* in our own lives. We'll close each evening with a brief service of Compline, and then be on our way home no later than 8:00.

This really is a low-cost, low-risk spiritual 'try-on' that stresses flexibility, doability and being gentle with oneself. It's ideal for anyone who's seeking to go a little deeper ... to live a little more intentionally ... to hold their faith in their heart and not just their head. And all are welcome!! In Pawling: A Gallery Exhibit in the Key of Lent

David Morrison shares "A Time of Reflection," a diverse collection of 40 works in pen and ink, acrylic paint, and glass art, at the Live 4 Art Gallery in Pawling, NY, which is owned by parishioner Ned Reade, during the month of March. The opening reception is tomorrow, Saturday, 12 March, from 5 to 7 pm.

His journey of creating "The Passion of Christ" started 20 years ago with his first piece in pen and ink, an abstracted Christ on the Cross entitled "You Are Not Alone." His desire to show the whole collection together gives observers a time to reflect, not only on The Passion of Christ, but also on their own journeys in life. It is a wonderful show to see during the penitential season of Lent.

This show went up on Friday, 04 March, and is up through Sunday, 27 March. Hours are Wednesday and Thursday 11 to 5, Friday and Saturday 11 to 6, and Sunday 11 to 3. The gallery is closed Mondays and Tuesdays.

They're Almost Here: Refugee Family is Now in Virginia!



We received word this week that the Turquoise Mountain families, one of whom we will be helping to resettle in New Milford, have left Doha and arrived at the "Safe Haven" in Virginia. We still do not know how long they will need to stay there before coming to Connecticut. It could be two days, a week or even more. In any event, we, together with the rest of the Washington (CT) Refugee Resettlement Project team, will be ready to welcome them.

As a way to welcome the family, Fr Douglas suggested that handwritten cards would be a great way to show the family that they are welcome and we are happy to have them here. Since the family speaks very little English (their native tongue is Dari), the welcome messages should probably be short and to the point. We think that the children in our parish could especially reach the children of the arriving family by creating cards with artwork and pictorial messages. Please bring your cards and creations to coffee hour at the Parish House this Sunday. There will be blank cards available, too, if you would like to create a card on-the-spot. We will deliver the cards to the house.

Summary of the February Vestry Meeting



The Vestry's meeting on 17 February—the first for our newly elected members —was devoted mostly to welcomes and orientation. The Vestry also approved several routine motions governing our financial and banking operations and appointing chairs of various parish commissions and committees. The annual Parochial Report for 2021 was also approved.

"New" Vestments for Lent

You may notice that we are using new, deep violet vestments for Lent this year. I received these as an ordination gift from the very first parish I ever served, as an intern before I began seminary: Holy Apostles' in Yardville, New Jersey. A parishioner named Lynda with whom I'd grown close during my time there had, in turn, donated them to Holy Apostles'. The vestments had been made for her father, who was, like me, also a 'second-career' priest. Very sadly, Lynda's father died not very long after he was ordained to the priesthood.

This set of vestments includes a frontlet, which hangs only part-way to the ground, rather than the complete frontal to which we are accustomed. The frontlet enables us to view the legs of the Altar and see it as a true table where, indeed, a banquet is served at every Holy Eucharist.


