Margie O'Brien, Director of the Children's The Bishops have, however, instructed the clergy to insist that Communicants refrain from receiving the Eucharistic wine by intinction, dipping the wafer into the wine chalice. In the past few days many of the priests have understood this to mean that the chalice will be consumed only by the Celebrant. This is a temporary measure, and as soon as possible the Celebrants will once again offer the chalice to all in attendance. Our Celebrant will instruct us accordingly on Sunday before Communion.

In the meantime, common sense on the part of all of us is important. The Bishops have not closed the doors of any of the parishes, and the routine liturgies should and will continue until the Bishops instruct us to close.

Therefore, if anyone feels uneasy about attending services, please stay home. If you are sick, or if you are not sure if you feel well, please stay home. It would be understandable if persons in a "high-risk" category might choose to skip church for the time being. We are family and as part of our family you are always in our prayers.

If you choose to attend the services, please plan to keep at least three feet between you and others in your pew. Please exchange the Peace with a smile and/or wave, an elbow bump, foot tap or simply with words. Please also greet people in the aisle and at the doors in the same way. And please do understand that coffee hour may be sparsely attended or may be suspended for a time.

Marel Rogers and the members of the Altar Guild are trying, with Lysol, to keep the nave as clean as possible. St Andrew's Church will be open for worship as usual for the foreseeable future, and until the Bishops tell us that this is inadvisable.

Please worship with others as you are willing and able and know that prayers at home are truly prayers. The Book of Common Prayer (pp.75-146) helps each of us to pray in unison with the whole of the Church.

Letter from the Bishops on the Coronavirus

February 28, 2020

Dear Companions in Christ,

A Holy Lent to you.

As you are likely already well aware, federal health officials have warned that it is anticipated that the COVID-19 (coronavirus) will probably spread into the United States. It has been recommended that churches, businesses, schools, and hospitals begin making preparations.

There are basic steps each of our communities within the Episcopal Church in Connecticut can follow to minimize risk for our parishes and people, and the ministries to which they contribute or by which they are served.

Randy Osolin, Verger We highly recommend reviewing the sound advice on precautions provided by the World Health Organization here on their website. Information is available in English, Spanish and other languages. Additional information, especially from Episcopal Relief and Development can be found at the links that follow.

Some initial actions we encourage you and your parishioners to pursue are:

- Wash your hands frequently, using soap and water or an alcohol-based rub. All clergy and eucharistic ministers should use an alcohol-based rub before the distribution of the sacrament, both in the context of the liturgy or in visiting someone at home or in the hospital.
- Practice keeping a safe distance in social interactions. In general, maintain a distance of a few feet between you and others, particular those who are coughing, sneezing, or evidently ill.
- At the peace encourage parishioners to exchange the peace of the Lord without touching.
- Try to avoid intinction in receiving the Eucharist as fingers and hands carry viruses and other pathogens. Assure parishioners that receiving in only one kind (in this case, the bread) is a full and sufficient participation in the sacrament.
- Practice respiratory hygiene. Cover your mouth when sneezing or coughing; discard tissues immediately in closed bins.
- Avoid shaking hands at the doorway after the service and other physical greetings.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Any parishes involved in ministries in which food is served (including coffee hour!) should give particular attention to The WHO recommendations regarding food safety.
- Needless to say, we should send a clear message that if anyone feels ill or unwell, they should, as a general rule, seek medical care immediately and

not attend parish events.

 Related to this, if someone who is elderly or lives alone does not appear at church in what would otherwise be a regular function, create systems for wellness checks.

Caring for each other and for all the people of God means being careful in the midst of an epidemic, and also communicating a non-anxious presence. By staying informed and prepared, we can keep our communities safe and healthy, as well as maintain our worship life and parish functions in the case of potential quarantine.

We will continue to monitor the development of the spread of COVID-19 and will be in touch as the epidemic continues. Please feel free to contact us if you have any questions or need any assistance. And please keep all affected by this disease in your prayers:

God of the present moment,
God who in Jesus stills the storm
and soothes the frantic heart;
bring hope and courage to all
who wait or work in uncertainty.
Bring hope that you will make them the equal
of whatever lies ahead.
Bring them courage to endure what cannot be avoided,
for your will is health and wholeness;
you are God, and we need you.

Become a Greeter

One of the most frequent compliments given about Saint Andrew's Church is that we are a welcoming place. People visiting, and people who attend regularly, consistently express this feeling of being welcomed to our worship.

We are in the process of building up our ranks of greeting teams We ask that you consider joining our ranks to greet people to Saint Andrews, for either the 8:30 Service and the 10:30 Service. You may sign up as a team (Janet and I signed up as a Team). Families are encouraged to sign up - that could be entertaining. You can join as an individual and we will pair you with another greeter. We are also inviting members to join as substitutes or part-time (occasional or seasonal) greeters, available to be called upon when regular greeters have family or other commitments.

Please consider joining the cadre of greeters at Saint Andrews. Help us continue to be that welcoming place - even more important during this time of transition. Greeting is a convenient and simple way to be of big service.




Dear Parishioners,

Lent Madness Begins February 27!

Want to be inspired by some saintly souls this Lent and have fun along the way? Join with thousands of Christians across denominations who have discovered the joyful online learning community that is Lent Madness. With its unique blend of competition, education, and humor, Lent Madness allows participants to be inspired by the ways in which God has worked through the lives of saints over the generations.

Based loosely on the NCAA basketball tournament of a similar name, this online devotion pits 32 saints against one another in a single elimination bracket as voters choose their favorites throughout Lent. Here's how to participate: on the

weekdays of Lent, information is posted at www.lentmadness.org about two different saints.

Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round. Sixteen saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo.

The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch.

This year, Lent Madness features an intriguing slate of saints ancient and modern, Biblical and ecclesiastical. This year's saints include heavyweights such as Patrick, Harriet Tubman, Clare of Assisi, Hildegaard of Bingen, Joseph, and Jude, along with many lesser known yet equally inspiring people of faith.

St. Andrew's participants will meet on *Wednesdays at 5 pm beginning March 4th*. Votes will have been cast online by then and our meetings will discuss the saints we voted for or passed over. Holy Eucharist or Evening Prayer will follow at 6 pm. We could all have dinner after the service if there's more to talk about!

If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

Tai Chi is a traditional Chinese fitness system based on the natural integration of mind, body and spirit. It has been proven over and over again to have a profoundly beneficial effect upon a wide range of health issues, both through the experiential claims of countless practitioners worldwide who swear by its usefulness and now also by an ever increasing collection of medical studies saying basically the same thing. The only catch to being able to utilize the full potential of Tai Chi practice is the difficulty of learning it. This class was developed as a collaboration between the Town of Kent Park and Rec Department and Christopher Kiely of the Falling Water Tai Chi School with the sole intention of providing a simple-as-possible path to learning.
