


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From Katherine Almquist, Junior Warden

I recently watched "Gentlemen's Agreement." It certainly was not the first time I had seen it. I am a huge fan of "Hollywood's Golden Age" and this 1947 movie was considered ground-breaking in its day. It was mentioned in a memoir I was reading, and it piqued my interest and bore another viewing. Gregory Peck plays a writer assigned to investigate Anti-Semitism—at work, hotels, country clubs. Gregory's fiancée, Dorothy McGuire, floats through, always elegantly attired, perfectly coiffed, looking as though she should have a champagne flute in hand, whatever the hour. To say the script is not exactly nuanced is an understatement. Bombastic is more its approach. There is one scene, however, that completely captivated me, because it struck such a real note. After a frothy cocktail party, Dorothy bemoans the Anti-Semitic comments she heard. The casual cruelty, so taken for granted. The arch, veiled remarks that pass for wit. The John Garfield character gives it right back to her: "What did you do about it?"

What did you do about it?

It just stuck in my mind. What did you do about it?

It also reminded me of what a friend (a very young friend, a six-year-old friend) told me about a daily reminder that his teacher gives her class: "Be Kind." His dear mother has added another phrase to this: "If you can't be kind, be quiet."

How many times have we heard unkind words said? Not an all-out attack, mind you, but unthinking, at someone else's expense? Someone else who is not there. What is the "right" reaction? Pointing out the error of the speaker's ways will get you nowhere fast, earn you an enemy and usually guarantee that you will be the next target.

What if Dorothy McGuire's character had simply said, "Why do you feel that way?" And waited for an answer?

We have all just come through Holy Week. Truly, a roller-coaster of emotions. Father Douglas brought to vivid, blazing life the events that took place over two thousand years ago—the devastation when betrayed by one who was thought to be a dear friend, the humiliation of being mocked, the agony of physical pain—and through it all, how many people DID anything about it? Who SAID anything about it?

Spring is here, although it seems rather reluctant at times. It is the blessed season of hope. The triumph of renewal. Let's embrace the sunshine and the bounty that is to come.

Let's do something about it.

During Eastertide: Evening Prayer and Benediction



Each Sunday during Eastertide this year, we will be praying Evening Prayer at 4:30. Some think of this office as the quintessential Anglican liturgy: quiet in tone, relaxed in pace and reflective. On 15 May, we will hold the office of Evensong—sung Evening Prayer—led by the visiting ensemble Saecula Schola Cantorum.

Following Evening Prayer, we will offer the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, for those who wish to stay. This is a brief but powerful liturgy in which we reverence and contemplate the Presence of Christ ... the Risen Christ ... in the consecrated Bread. We'll use a bit of incense during Benediction, but not during Evening Prayer.

We invite you to try on these liturgies ... and the practice of concluding your Lord's Day in some quiet, joyful worship ... during the season of Easter.

Sunday, 01 May: The Sherman Chamber Ensemble Returns



The Sherman Chamber Ensemble's "Best of Baroque" concerts have been praised as "stunning performances ... inspiring and uplifting." This year promises the same. Usually held in early January to herald in the New Year, this year's Baroque concerts were postponed to the spring out of caution due to the COVID pandemic.

Audiences will be treated to works by masters of the Baroque era played by the best of today's chamber music artists. The concert is in memory of the Ensemble's long-time friend and performer, harpsichordist Ken Cooper, and is dedicated to Bill McGoldrick, remembered for his commitment to the Ensemble.

The program will include music for piano, flute and strings by Corelli, Handel, Vivaldi. It concludes with one of the most beloved works of the Baroque repertoire – Bach's *Brandenburg Concerto No. 5, BWV 105Q* said by some to have secured his place among the greatest composers of the Baroque era.

Joining the Ensemble for the first time is Yamaha Artist and pianist Evan Shinners, a graduate of the Juilliard School and now a mentor at the institution. Since 2010, he has devoted himself almost exclusively to the study and performance of the works of J S Bach.

The Ensemble will present this concert on Sunday, 01 May, at 4:00 pm, here at St Andrew's. General Admission tickets are \$25, and children ages 15 and under are admitted free. 
THE PARISH IS OPEN.

The Afghan Refugee Family Has Arrived!





Here is an update from the Washington (CT) Refugee Resettlement Project on the family we have helped relocate to New Milford:

Our long-awaited Afghan refugee family has arrived! Two weeks ago, we welcomed a family of six: Mr Alibaba Awrang, Ms Gul Ziwar Awrang, his wife, their 14-year-old daughter, and three sons (ages 10, 12 and 15). The Awrangs are now settling into their New Milford home, which was rented and furnished with your generous donations.

- Mr Awrang is known around the world as one of the most esteemed Islamic calligraphers alive today. An instructor at the Turquoise Mountain Institute of Arts and Architecture, he has participated in exhibitions around the world, including the Smithsonian. Above are two examples of his work.
- Ms. Awrang is a homemaker and talented needle weaver of local Bamiyan patterns. (Bamiyan is a region of Afghanistan known for its weaving and carpets.) We are also seeking a gently used newer model sewing machine or a sponsor for this item. You can email us at info@wrrp.net if interested.
- All members of the family are already working with Literacy Volunteers on the Green to gain English language proficiency, and we are in the process of registering the children in public schools in New Milford.
- They are one of nine families who were evacuated by the Turquoise Mountain Foundation, and are all being resettled in Connecticut (www.turquoisemountain.org). Turquoise Mountain was established in Afghanistan in 2006 by His Royal Highness, The Prince of Wales, to revive historic areas and traditional crafts, to provide jobs, skills and a renewed sense of pride among Afghans.

We are committed to helping Alibaba's family and the other newly arrived Afghan artisans to gain self-sufficiency in their new community, and, with Turquoise Mountain, to help them get back to practicing their art, developing their art business skills, and showcasing their work in exhibitions. *If you have business contacts or suggestions that might assist in this effort, please contact us at info@wrrp.net.*


