
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The Importunate Neighbour (Luke 11:5-8) :: Proper 12, Year C (William Holman Hunt, 1895)

A few weeks ago, I headed to NYC to see a friend in an Off-Broadway production. It is always a treat to see Jeremiah on stage. He is insanely talented, and it also gave me the opportunity to have lunch with my beloved niece. It was the last Sunday in June which also happened to be Pride Day. I took the train from the Ten Mile River and at each station saw groups of young people get on—kids, really. All were dressed (or undressed, which was frequently the case) in rainbow attire. Metro North never looked so colorful. The trek across town was equally bright.

Fast forward a few weeks. The gospel that particular Sunday was the story of the Good Samaritan, and it is, without doubt, one of the best known in the world. Father Douglas's riveting sermon truly brought that tale to life. Who is our neighbor? What is our responsibility towards that neighbor? Age old questions that never fail to spark debate, be it on the national level or on Keeler Road in Sharon, Connecticut.

Okay, let's get back to Pride Day, lunch with my niece, Pam, and Jeremiah's play.

Over lunch, I asked Pam, who is gay, if she ever experienced any prejudice, slights, smirks, or at least raised eyebrows. She is 26, a writer living in Brooklyn, and one of the most social beings I have ever met. Her answer was simple: "No." She has a loving family, open and accepting friends from a variety of backgrounds. She is truly out and about with straight people as well as those from the LGBTQ community. I mused about the term "Queer" --- how it was a pejorative until pretty recently. I remember (in my salad days) living in Chicago and being the "beard" at more than one office Christmas party. It simply was not accepted to be "out." Certainly not outside of the arts. Pam and I continued the conversation to the theatre, where the play "The Refugees" posed the Good Samaritan question: "Just who is our neighbor?"

I was lost in various thoughts on the train ride home. I am always struck by how many really fine actors are out there, the vast majority of whom will never experience fame, let alone fortune. Right before every show I see, I get a thrill that I am about to see people doing what they love best, and giving it their all.

I thought about the dozens and dozens of rainbow-attired kids, from Dover Plains, Patterson, Pawling, Pleasantville, White Plains, going to the city to celebrate. Did they have the faintest idea what their elders had gone through so that they now had glorious freedom?

I thought about the Good Samaritan and the family I saw on 51st Street, between 10th and 11th, so clearly homeless and so far removed from the celebration in mid-town. I thought back to Father Douglas's sermon---they are all our neighbors. What we do about it is up to us.

If we can't help all, let's help one. We can then go back and help one more. And maybe one more after that.

In giving consent to Jeff's ordination and consecration, standing committees and bishops exercising jurisdiction in the Episcopal Church attest to knowing of "no impediment on account of which" he ought not to be ordained as bishop, and that his election was conducted in accordance with the canons.

Jeff was elected bishop diocesan at a diocesan convention on May 21. His ordination service is scheduled for October 15.






